2023 Black Church Equality Fellowship

Request for Proposals

In partnership with Trinity Church Wall Street, Pride in the Pews is pleased to offer the 2023 Black Church Equality Fellowship (BCEF). The BCEF is a distinguished nationwide leadership development program for Black faith leaders committed to advancing congregation-based programmatic initiatives that promote LGBTQ+ inclusion. Selected Black faith-leaders will receive a \$4,000 grant, 1-on-1 consulting support, ongoing learning opportunities, and two all-expenses-paid trips to Chicago for mandatory cohort convenings.

Proposed projects will leverage the local congregational setting (e.g., Sunday services, bible studies and growth groups, church staff retreats, faith-based conferences, congregation-based podcasts or web series, church ministries) to launch programming that destigmatizes LGBTQ+ related conversations, programming, and ministry offerings. The projects will be shepherded by a two-person team consisting of congregation-based leaders, including pastors, ministers, lay leaders, congregants, and church staff. Through relationship-building, resource-sharing, and community-building, the cohort will develop and refine effective tools, strategies, and bridge-building skills to bridge the gap between the Black Church and the LGBTQ+ community.

We invite Black congregations of all sizes, denominations, and governing structures in any U.S. state to apply. We also invite congregations across the theological spectrum to apply, recognizing that each congregational context is unique and dynamic. Please note that you **DO NOT** have to identify as LGBTQ+ to apply for the BCEF; allies and co-conspirators are welcomed.

Program Overview

In partnership with Trinity Church Wall Street, Pride in the Pews is pleased to offer the 2023 Black Church Equality Fellowship (BCEF). The BCEF is a distinguished nationwide leadership development program for Black faith leaders committed to advancing congregation-based programmatic initiatives that promote LGBTQ+ inclusion. The grants will present Black congregations with the opportunity to facilitate community-wide learning opportunities that bridge the gap between the Black Church and the LGBTQ+ community.

Timeline

All grants will be awarded in the Spring on a rolling basis until March 24, 2023. The grant implementation period will commence in March 2023 and conclude in December 2023.

Required Meetings

Cohort Launch in Chicago | Thursday March 30th, 2023 – Saturday, April 1st, 2023

Virtual Grantee Meetings | April, May, June, August, September (one, one-hour virtual meeting in each of the listed months; specific dates and times TBD)

- Grantee Meeting Topics include Black Liberation Theology, Religion and Media, Bridge-building, Trauma Informed Spiritual Care, and Strategies for Advancing LGBTQ+ Inclusion within Various Congregational Contexts

Cohort Finale in Chicago | November 2nd, 2023 – November 4th, 2023

Please note that the team lead for each project is **REQUIRED** to attend the cohort launch and finale, and at least one team member is required to attend each virtual grantee meeting. If your project team is unable to fulfil the enumerated time commitments, we encourage you to apply in future cycles.

Use of Grant Funds

Grant awards are meant to support grantees for the time and energy it takes to create and lead programmatic initiatives. Grantees will be able to use these funds for convenings, marketing materials, staffing, and technological support, and honorariums. All funding must be used to directly support the proposed project.

Grant Terms and Requirements

If accepted, grantees will be asked to submit a headshot, information about their congregation, and a blurb about their projects. Pride in the Pews requires all grantees to submit a project status update approximately at the mid-point of the fellowship and a final report at the end of the fellowship. These reports will include information on all project-related activities and a budget showing how the funds were spent.

Project leads are required to attend both in-person Chicago convenings, and at least one team member is required to attend all virtual grantee meetings.

Grantees are encouraged to schedule one-on-one consultations with Rev. Stephen J. Thurston in the ideation and implementation phase of their projects.

Disbursement of Grant Funds

Pride in the Pews will disperse grant funds in two installments: 1) After the first cohort convening in Chicago and 2) After the completion of the first mid-point project status update. Funds will be dispersed once we receive the following:

- A signed Memorandum of Understanding
- Submit church's W9 to Pride in the Pews
- Attend the first cohort convening
